### Flemish Peace Institute

- Established by Decree in 2004
- Research
  - Arms trade and production
    - Legal framework (FL, BE, EU, UN) and control regimes
    - Defence industry
    - Firearms
    - Transhipment
    - Export control lists
    - ...
  - Peace and society



### Flemish Peace Institute

  - Flemish Arms Decree

  - Marking of ammunition

- Distinctions between:
  - Firearms (civilian) SALW (military equipment)
  - Transfers within EU export outside EU



- Directive 91/477/EEC on control of the acquisition and possession of weapons
  - Amended in May 2008 (Directive 2008/51)
  - Focus: private citizens
  - Motive: no more internal borders
    - → need for coordinated regulations
  - Minimal requirements that need to be implemented in national legislation

- 4 categories of firearms with different rules
  - A: Prohibited firearms
  - B: Firearms subject to authorization
  - C: Firearms subject to declaration
  - D: Other firearms
- Other requirements:
  - Legitimate reason, age requirements, public safety
  - Marking and registration of firearms
  - Authorization for arms dealers
  - Procedures for transfers within EU






#### Directive 91/477/EC

- Requirements that need to be implemented in national legislation
  - License required for transfer
  - Authorization for transfers between arms dealers
  - European firearms pass







### Regulation 258/2012

- Focus: private citizens firearms for civilian use
- License required for export
  - Approval of import by country of destination
- Considerations:
  - International obligations and commitments
  - National foreign and security policy
  - Intended end use, (final) recipient and risk of diversion
- Confidential denial notification

#### Common Position 2008/944/CFSP

- Successor of Code of Conduct (1998), but legally binding
- Common list of military equipment
- License required for "export"
  - Case-by-case basis
  - 8 assessment criteria
  - reliable prior knowledge of end use
- Confidential denial notification
- User's guide







#### Directive 2009/43/EC

- Requirements that need to be implemented in national legislation
- Focus: simplify rules and procedures for intra-Community transfers
  - General licenses
  - Global licenses
  - Individual licenses
- Possibility of export limitations




### From paper to reality

  - Not led to substantially more restrictive arms export policies

  - Not led to substantially more restrictive arms export policies
  - Not significantly strengthened the process of harmonization

### **Need for evidence-inspired policy**


- → Review of Directive 91/477/EC (by July 2015)

    - Go beyond mere correlations
    - Case Belgium




## Belgium - suicides

## Belgium - homicides







### **Need for evidence-inspired policy**
