

# South East Europe Armed Violence Monitor

**Quarterly Regional Report** 

July-September 2023

#### **Background**

The widespread proliferation and misuse of firearms continue to pose a grave threat around the globe. To echo the concern about the negative impact of firearms on security, human rights, as well as social and economic development, UNDP SEESAC initiated data collection in 2014 to track the firearm-related incidents in South East Europe (SEE) and established a Regional Armed Violence Monitoring Platform (AVMP).

The AVMP covers Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, the Republic of Moldova, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Serbia and Kosovo\*. The data is gathered daily from the relevant authorities' official websites, as well as print and online media. Data for Kosovo is also gathered from daily police reports.

The present regional report builds on monthly Armed Violence Monitor Reports, and it has been prepared to provide a collection of data, show the trends, highlights, as well as threats regarding firearm incidents in SEE from **July-September**<sup>1</sup> **2023**.

Quarterly AVMP regional reports aim to serve as an information tool to research organizations and all interested parties engaged in the area of small arms and light weapons with the primary goal of providing a better understanding of the firearms' negative impact on civilians.

#### **TYPE OF INCIDENTS**




72 people did not sustain a gunshot injury when a firearm was discharged in their presence.



21 explosions were reported, 19 of which were undetermined, and 2 were criminally related.



134 incidents involved multiple types of SALW, nearly double the number from the previous quarter.



### **NUMBER OF INCIDENTS**

A total of **953** firearm incidents were recorded this quarter, a **14% increase** from the last quarter's 832 incidents.

In **August**, there were **380** firearm incidents, marking the highest number of incidents ever recorded by the AVMP in a single month.






Weapon seizures (456) and undetermined shootings (124) were the most reported types of incidents.

### **MAIN TRENDS - Weapon seizures**

- During this quarter, there were **456 reported weapon seizures**, making them the most common type of firearm incident, **accounting for 48% of all incidents**.
- This represents a **15% increase** compared to the 395 cases in the previous quarter and a **20% rise from the same period last year** (380 cases).
- The increase was primarily attributed to a significant number of weapon seizures documented in August (177).




- The highest number of seizures was recorded in Kosovo, followed by Montenegro and North Macedonia. Kosovo and North Macedonia witnessed notable increases, with a rise of 23% and 28%, respectively.
- **Handguns** remained the **most seized** type of weapon, being reported in **138** cases. **Kosovo** had the highest number of handgun seizures, totalling **75** cases.
- Explosives were **the second most seized weapon**, with **North Macedonia (18)** and **Kosovo (14)** continuing to document the highest numbers.
- Seizures of rifles/shotguns increased by 24% compared to the previous quarter, rising from 38 to 47 cases. Kosovo (13) and Montenegro (9) reported most seizures of this type of weapon.




Seizures of multiple types of SALW increased by 72% from the previous quarter (from 54 to 93 cases). Most of these seizures were reported in Montenegro (36).

# MAIN TRENDS (CONT.) - Undetermined shootings<sup>3</sup>

- **Undetermined shootings**, as the **second most reported** type of incident, documented a total of **124 cases**, showing a **15% increase** compared to the previous guarter's 107 cases.
- **Kosovo** reported the **highest number**, making up **54%** of all **undetermined shootings** and demonstrating a **35% increase** from the previous quarter. North Macedonia experienced a considerable increase of 112%. On the other hand, Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, and Serbia observed declines of 44%, 72%, and 27%, respectively.



- Undetermined shootings resulted in 59 victims, of whom 6 people were reported as killed and 27 as injured.
- Out of the **95 perpetrators**, **92 were men**. The perpetrators were caught in 63 incidents, while they remained unknown in 58 cases.




Four most reported types of weapons in undetermined shootings in July-September 2023 period

• In 57 cases where the type of firearm was indicated, handguns were the primary weapon, being used in 30 undetermined shootings, nearly identical to the previous quarter (29 cases). The use of automatic/military-grade weapons and gas pistols remained consistent with the previous quarter. However, the number of undetermined shootings involving rifles/shotguns doubled in number.


<sup>3</sup> Undetermined shooting refers to any firearm discharge under unknown circumstances and motives, regardless of whether or not such incident caused a fatality, injury, or damage.

#### **MAIN TRENDS (CONT.) - Criminal context**

- Firearm incidents in the criminal context decreased from 107 to 100 cases, maintaining
  a downward trend with a 7% decline since the previous quarter.
- Nearly all jurisdictions **reported a decrease**, except for Serbia and Kosovo, which recorded increases of 47% and 25%, respectively.



- The number of **armed robberies** continued to **decline**, dropping from 35 cases in the previous quarter to **28 this quarter**. No armed robberies were reported in Moldova and Montenegro this quarter.
- A total of **32** firearm incidents were associated with **organized crime**, indicating an **11% decline** from the previous quarter. **Bosnia and Herzegovina** (**14**), with the same number of these incidents as in the previous quarter, **accounted for 44% of all these incidents.**




Two most reported types of incidents under the criminal context category in the July-September 2023 period


55 victims of incidents in criminal context were reported, among whom 7 were killed, 10 injured and 25 threatened.

# MAIN TRENDS (CONT.) Celebratory shootings

- A total of 85 celebratory shootings were recorded, marking a significant increase since the previous quarter with 17 such cases and a 27% drop from the same period last year when 117 incidents were reported.
- **Kosovo** accounted for **89%** of all celebratory shootings this quarter. Compared to the same period last year, Kosovo documented a 33% decline.



- **Gas pistols (33)** and **handguns (25)** were the most used types of weapons. In 58 incidents, firearms were in illegal possession.
- A total of 74 celebratory shootings occurred during family celebrations.
- Five men were injured in celebratory shootings.
- A total of 94 perpetrators were recorded, of whom 92 were men, when the data on sex was available.



#### **PERPETRATORS**


From July to September 2023, there were **1,047 perpetrators** of firearm incidents, of whom



Men were identified as perpetrators mostly in incidents related to weapon seizures (47%), criminal context (12%) and public disputes (11%).

Women were identified as perpetrators mostly in incidents related to weapon seizures (42%) and criminal context (17%).

• In incidents where the age of **men and women perpetrators** was reported, the majority fell under the **age group of 19-35**, closely followed by the y 36-60 age group.



• For **524 (50%) perpetrators, age was not reported**. For 77 perpetrators, neither sex nor age was reported.

#### **VICTIMS**

From July to September 2023, there were **331 victims**⁵ of firearm incidents, of whom




for **42** sex was not reported

Women victims were mostly reported in incidents related to domestic violence (51%), criminal context (22%) and undetermined shootings (18%).

Men victims were mostly reported in incidents related to public disputes (39%), undetermined shootings (18%) and criminal context (14%).

• In incidents where the age of **men** and **women victims** was reported, the majority fell under the **age group of 19-35**, followed by the 36-60 age group.



• For **187** (**56%**) **victims**, **age was not reported**. For 31 victims, neither sex nor age was reported.


<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> Victim refers to any individual who has been threatened, injured or died as a result of the use of a firearm/ammunition/explosives.

Victims also include those who were present when a firearm was discharged but did not sustain a gunshot injury and those who were present during an incident in which a firearm was present but was not used.

#### **OUTCOME FOR VICTIMS**

45 people were killed with firearms, a 10% less since the previous quarter. Victims were mainly killed in domestic violence (14) and public disputes (10).

108 victims were injured, a 11% drop from the previous quarter. 37 victims were injured in public disputes, and 27 in undetermined shootings.

**89** victims were threatened with firearms, **31% less** than in the previous quarter. **37** victims were threatened in public disputes, and **25** in criminal context.


<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>9</sup> Not applicable refers to all incidents in which a weapon is present but not used or discharged (for example, theft of a weapon).

#### **TYPE OF WEAPONS**



In **566** (59%) **incidents**, the firearms used were in **illegal possession**, while in **34** (4%) cases, they were in **legal possession**. In 352 (37%) incidents, the status of possession was not reported.

- **Handguns** were reported in **298 incidents**, a 10% more than in the previous quarter. Apart from being seized in 138 cases, this type of firearm was used in the criminal context in **48 cases**, and in 33 **public disputes**.
- Rifles/shotguns were reported in 82 incidents, showing a 34 % rise since the
  previous quarter. In nearly 74% of the cases, this type of weapon was
  seized.



The graph represents the number of incidents in which the five most reported types of weapons were used. During this quarter, in 17% of all reported cases, the type of firearm was either unknown or not reported.

- Gas pistols were reported in 82 incidents, showing a notable upward trend compared to the previous quarter (50 cases). This type of firearm was reported as seized in almost half of cases (35 cases), but it was also used in celebratory shootings (33 cases).
- Explosive devices, as the third most used type of weapon, were reported in 76 incidents, 11% less than in the previous quarter. In 36 cases, explosives were reported as found accidentally by civilians, while in 19 cases they were used in undetermined explosions.
- Automatic/military-grade weapons were reported in 63 incidents, primarily in weapon seizures (37 cases). A 17% rise from the previous reporting period was observed in relation to this type of weapon.

### **MACRO AND MICROLOCATION**


From July to September 2023
